Privacy Notice – School Governors

Under data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how the school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'privacy notices' (sometimes called 'fair processing notices') to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about our school Governing Board.

We, Waddesdon Village Primary School, are the 'data controller' for the purposes of data protection law. Our data protection officer is Jai Lablans (see 'Contact us' below).

The personal data we process

We process data relating to Governors. Personal data that we may collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) about you includes, but is not restricted to:

- personal identifiers, contacts and characteristics (such as name, date of birth, contact details and postcode)
- governance details (such as role, start and end dates and governor ID)
- Photographs
- CCTV Footage

Why we collect and use Governance Information

The personal data collected is essential, in order for the school to fulfil their official functions and meet legal requirements.

We collect and use governance information, for the following purposes:

- a) To meet the statutory duties placed on us

Under the UK General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) 2018, the legal bases we rely on for processing personal information for general purposes are to comply with Article 6(1)(c) and Article 9(2)(b) of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

- For the purpose a) named above in accordance with the legal basis of legal obligation.

All local authority maintained school governing bodies, under [section 538 of the Education Act 1996](#) and academy trusts, under the [Academies Financial Handbook academy trust handbook](#) have a legal duty to provide the governance information as detailed above.

In addition, concerning any special category data:

- conditions of [UK GDPR - Article 9](#)
- Article 9 lists the conditions for processing special category data:

- (a) Explicit consent
- (b) Employment, social security and social protection (if authorised by law)
- (c) Vital interests
- (d) Not-for-profit bodies
- (e) Made public by the data subject
- (f) Legal claims or judicial acts
- (g) Reasons of substantial public interest (with a basis in law)
- (h) Health or social care (with a basis in law)
- (i) Public health (with a basis in law)
- (j) Archiving, research and statistics (with a basis in law)
- When relying on conditions (b), (h), (i) or (j), we would also need to meet the associated condition in UK law, set out in Part 1 of [Schedule 1 of the DPA 2018](#).
- When relying on the substantial public interest condition in Article 9(2)(g), we would also need to meet one of 23 specific substantial public interest conditions set out in Part 2 of Schedule 1 of the DPA 2018.
- **What are the substantial public interest conditions?**
- The 23 substantial public interest conditions are set out in paragraphs 6 to 28 of Schedule 1 of the DPA 2018:
- 6. Statutory and government purposes
- 7. Administration of justice and parliamentary purposes
- 8. Equality of opportunity or treatment
- 9. Racial and ethnic diversity at senior levels
- 10. Preventing or detecting unlawful acts
- 11. Protecting the public
- 12. Regulatory requirements
- 13. Journalism, academia, art and literature
- 14. Preventing fraud
- 15. Suspicion of terrorist financing or money laundering
- 16. Support for individuals with a particular disability or medical condition
- 17. Counselling
- 18. Safeguarding of children and individuals at risk
- 19. Safeguarding of economic well-being of certain individuals
- 20. Insurance
- 21. Occupational pensions
- 22. Political parties
- 23. Elected representatives responding to requests
- 24. Disclosure to elected representatives
- 25. Informing elected representatives about prisoners
- 26. Publication of legal judgments
- 27. Anti-doping in sport
- 28. Standards of behaviour in sport

Collecting governance information

We collect personal information via governor contact forms.

Governance roles data is essential for the school's operational use. Whilst the majority of personal information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it may be requested on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with UK-GDPR, we will inform you at the point of collection, whether you are required to provide certain information to us or if you have a choice in this.

Storing governance information

Who we share governance information with

We routinely share this information with:

- our local authority (where applicable)
- the Department for Education (DfE)

Why we share governance information

We do not share information about individuals in governance roles with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Local authority

We are required to share information about our governance roles with our local authority (LA) and the Department for Education (DfE) who collect personal data from educational providers and local authorities. We are required to share information about individuals in governance roles with the Department for Education (DfE), under section 538 of the Education Act 1996

We are required to share information about individuals in governance roles with the Department for Education (DfE) under the requirements set out in the [Academies Financial Handbook academy trust handbook](#)

All data is entered manually on the GIAS service and held by the Department for Education (DfE) under a combination of software and hardware controls which meet the current [government security policy framework](#).

Requesting access to your personal data

The UK GDPR gives you certain rights about how your information is collected and used. To make a request for your personal information, contact Michelle Meadows on (01296) 651237.

Your rights include:

- the right to be informed about the collection and use of your personal data – this is called 'right to be informed'.
- the right to ask us for copies of personal information we have about you – this is called 'right of access', this is also known as a subject access request (SAR), data subject access request or right of access request.
- the right to ask us to change any information you think is not accurate or complete – this is called 'right to rectification'.
- the right to ask us to delete your personal information – this is called 'right to erasure'.
- the right to ask us to stop using your information – this is called 'right to restriction of processing'.
- the 'right to object to processing' of your information, in certain circumstances.
- rights in relation to automated decision making and profiling.
- the right to withdraw consent at any time (where relevant).
- the right to [complain to the Information Commissioner](#) if you feel we have not used your information in the right way.

There are legitimate reasons why your information rights request may be refused. For example, some rights will not apply:

- right to erasure does not apply when the lawful basis for processing is legal obligation or public task.
- right to portability does not apply when the lawful basis for processing is legal obligation, vital interests, public task or legitimate interests.
- right to object does not apply when the lawful basis for processing is contract, legal obligation or vital interests. And if the lawful basis is consent, you don't have the right to object, but you have the right to withdraw consent.

If you have a concern about the way we are collecting or using your personal data, you should raise your concern with us in the first instance or directly to the Information Commissioner's Office at [raise a concern with ICO](#)

Withdrawal of consent and the right to lodge a complaint

How government uses your data

The governance data that we lawfully share with the Department for Education (DfE) via GIAS will:

- increase the transparency of governance arrangements
- enable local authority maintained schools, academies, academy trusts and the Department for Education (DfE) to identify more quickly and accurately individuals who are involved in governance and who govern in more than one context
- allow the Department for Education (DfE) to be able to uniquely identify an individual and in a small number of cases conduct checks to confirm their suitability for this important and influential role

Data collection requirements

Some of these personal data items are not publicly available and are encrypted within the GIAS system. Access is restricted to authorised Department for Education (DfE) and education establishment users with a Department for Education (DfE) Sign-in account who need to see it in order to fulfil their official duties. The information is for internal purposes only and not shared beyond the Department for Education (DfE) unless the law allows it.

How to find out what personal information the Department for Education (DfE) hold about you

Under the terms of the [Data Protection Act 2018](#), you're entitled to ask the Department for Education (DfE):

- if they are processing your personal data
- for a description of the data they hold about you
- the reasons they're holding it and any recipient it may be disclosed to
- for a copy of your personal data and any details of its source

If you want to see the personal data held about you by the Department for Education (DfE), you should make a subject access request (SAR).
