Class 3 Home Learning

There are 3 areas of homework to complete each week:

1. **Reading:** You should read for 20 minutes on at least 4 days each week. The expectation is that you will record these 4 days, when you have read at home, in your Reading Record and hand this in each Monday. Your Reading Record will be returned back to you on the same day. When you read, think about what you have read, collect examples of rich vocabulary and discuss your book with an adult regularly. Vary the authors, genres and text types you select and strive to read from the Reading Rocket selection often.
2. **Maths:** You should log on to **Times Tables Rock Stars** at home at least 3 times each week to practise your tables and arithmetic skills.
3. You need to choose either an **English or a maths activity** to complete in your homework book and hand this in on **Monday**. Try to choose from each section over the half-term. Books will be returned to you each **Thursday**.

Trying your very best, being organised with homework and meeting these expectations will result in house points, stickers or certificates and, of course, you will be learning, practising key skills and becoming an independent learner.

If any of the 3 homework expectations are not fully complete, the consequence will be to complete the missing work during break time on Thursday morning. If there is more than 1 expectation missing, you will also need to stay in during Thursday lunch time.

English Activities:

The English homework is based on your reading books. Therefore, regular reading (and reading books from beginning to end) will help you do these activities well.

- Read a book or a graphic novel about a superhero. Use your imagination to think of superpowers for members of your family. Write a short description to explain what power you chose for them and why.
- Create a presentation about our History topic 'The Romans'. It can be on a computer or a hand-written presentation. Create 3-4 different slides presenting everything you have learnt about The Romans!
- Write an alternative ending for your favourite book we have read this year. What will happen? Will it be a happy or a sad ending? Which characters will be involved?
- Choose a setting from your reading book. Can you write a setting description of it? Use your senses to help you – what can you see? What can you hear? What can you touch? How does it smell? Try to use some adventurous adjectives.

Maths Activities:

- Look out of your window/go outside and complete a car survey. You could count how many cars you see that are different colours. Record your data as a tally chart and then present as a graph.
- Measure the length of 6 different items in your house or garden. Using the measurements, order them from smallest to biggest and biggest to smallest.
- Go on a walk. Find and write a list of 2D shapes you see. For example, a circular road sign. Challenge yourself by finding 3D shapes as well!
- Select a category (such as insects, rainfall, fruit and vegetables) and collect data for it – you could use a tally chart to do this. Present the data in a method of your choice, such as a bar graph, line graph or pie chart.
- Accurately draw 4 clocks in your book. Make each time on the clock:
1) 12:30 2) 4:20 3) 8:45 4) 11:15
2) Write each time in 24-hour digital clock for AM and PM.
