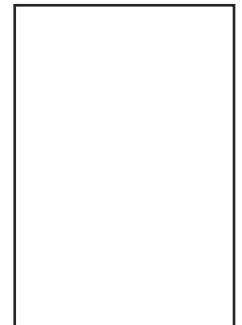
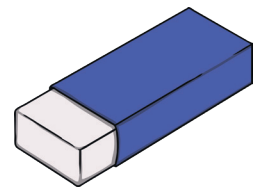
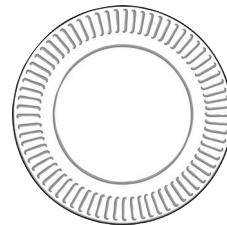
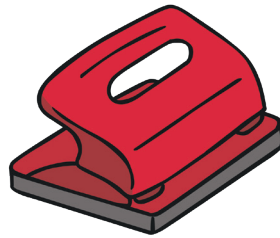
Paper Plate Clock Craft Activity

You can make:



What you will need:

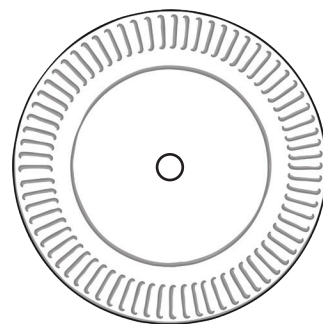
- A paper plate
- Scissors
- A ruler
- A rubber
- A hole puncher
- A split pin/paper fastener
- A pencil
- Felt tips or markers
- Clock hands template (included in this pack)
- An A4 piece of card (ideally coloured, but plain is fine)



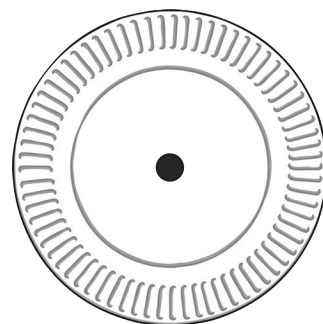
Instructions

What you need to do:

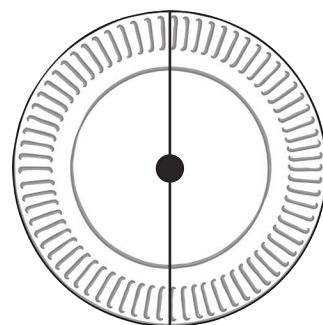
1. Use a pencil to make a small mark in the middle of your paper plate.



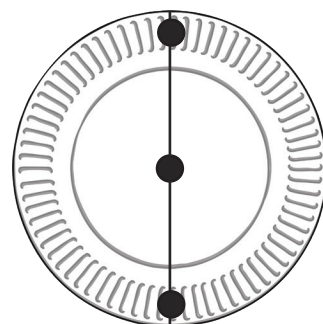
2. Ask an adult to poke a hole through the mark you have made. They can use scissors or a split pin.



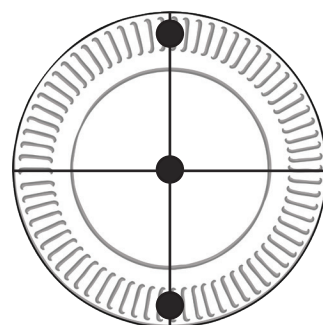
3. Now, use a pencil and a ruler to draw a line down the middle of the paper plate, through the circle. Don't make the line too thick or dark, because we're going to rub it out later.



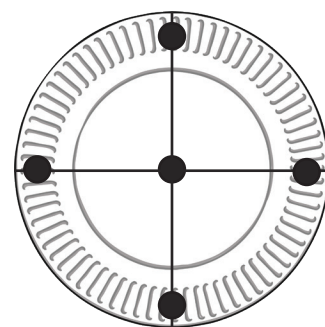
4. Make a small mark on the paper plate at each end of the line, like this. Don't forget to use a pencil.



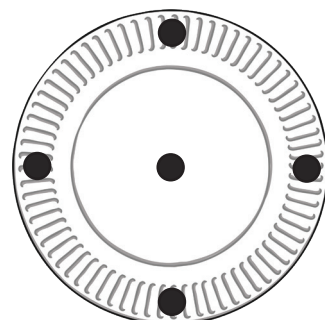
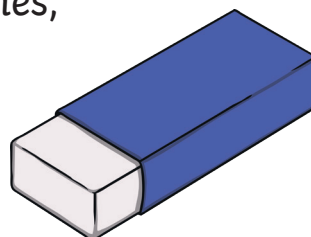
5. Use a pencil and a ruler to draw a line going horizontally through the middle of the paper plate. Again, remember to use a pencil, because we will rub this line out later. It should make a cross on your plate, like this:



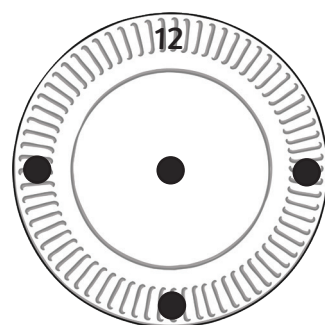
6. Use a pencil to make a mark at each end of the line you've just drawn. It should look like this:



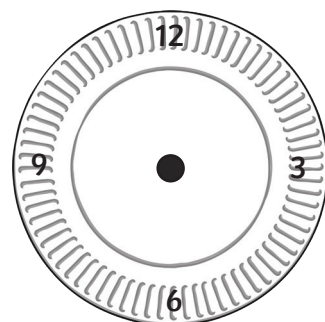
7. Use a rubber to rub out the two lines, so your plate looks like this



8. Use a pen (a marker or a felt tip pen) to write the number 12 where the mark at the top of your paper plate is. Then, use a rubber to rub out the pencil mark.



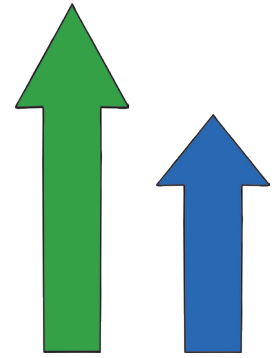
9. Now, use a pen to mark the number 3, 6, and 9 on the clock where the other pencil marks are. Remember to rub out the pencil marks afterwards. It should look like this:



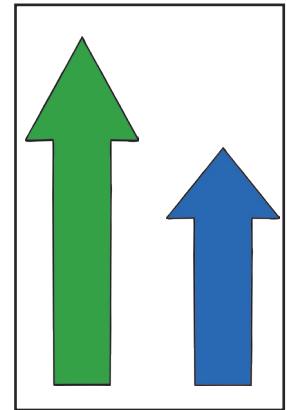
10. Next, we need to fill in the missing numbers. You can check whether you have put the numbers in the correct place by starting at the number one and counting to 12 around the paper plate. The numbers should all be in order.



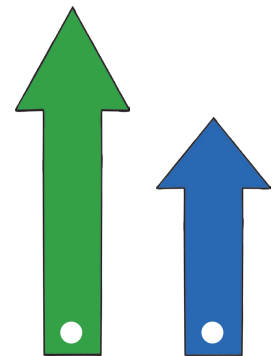
11. Now it's time to make our clock hands. Cut around the clock hands templates. Ask an adult to help you with this bit.



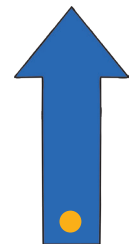
12. Glue the clock hands onto a piece of card. Then, cut around them again. Sticking them onto a piece of card will help them to last longer and make it harder to accidentally rip or tear them.



13. Use a hole puncher to make a hole at the bottom of each of your clock hands (not the arrow bit). You might need an adult to help this bit.



14. We're nearly there! Take your split pin and carefully put it through the hole in the smaller clock hand. This clock hand is the hour hand.

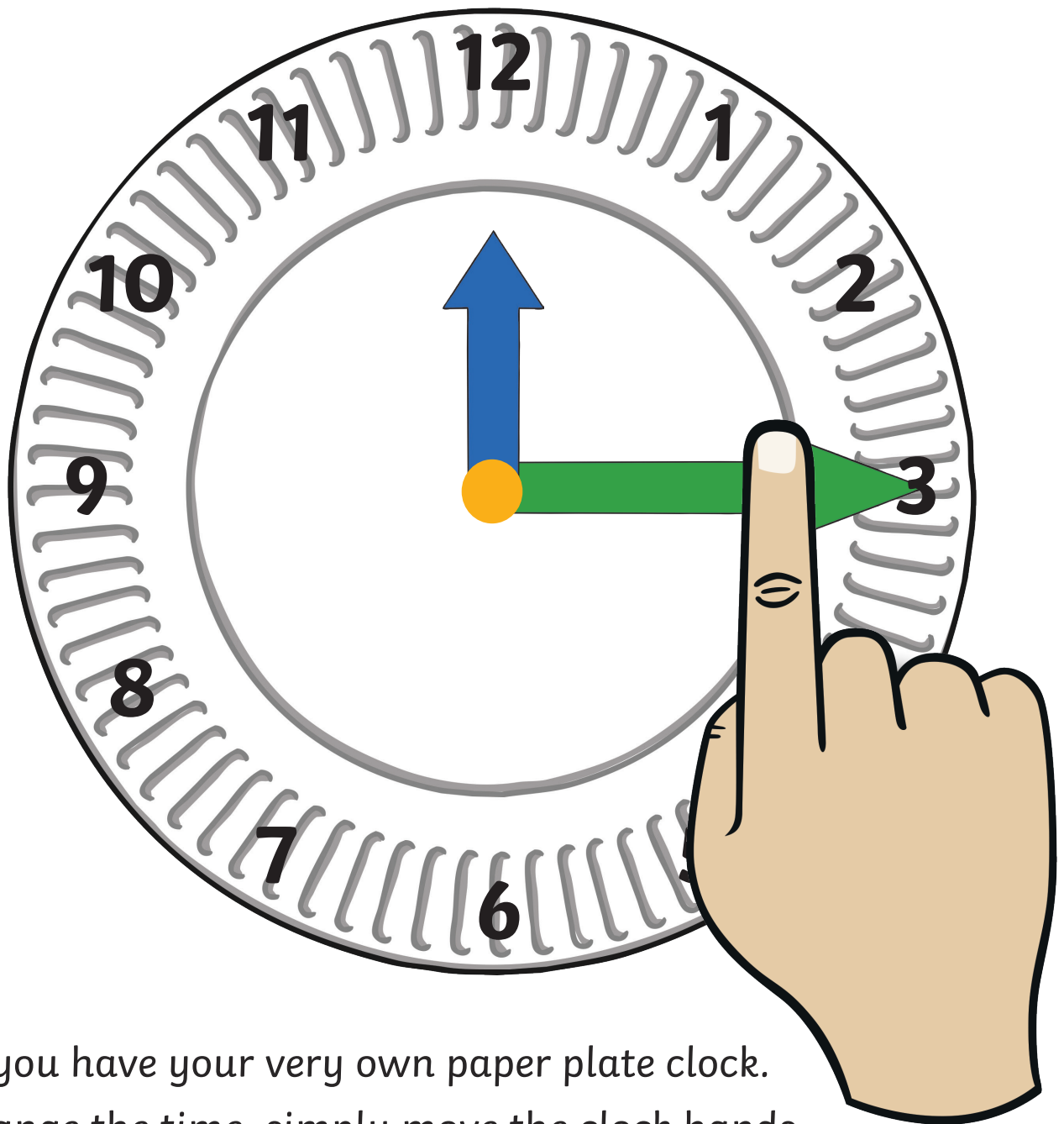


15. Now put the same split pin through the hole in the bigger clock hand. This clock hand is the minutes hand.



Final Step:

Put the split pin through the hole you made in the middle of your paper plate in Step 2. Turn your paper plate over and carefully bend the legs of the split pin outwards so that the clock hands stay in place.



Now you have your very own paper plate clock. To change the time, simply move the clock hands.

Can you put the hands to 3 o'clock? What about half past 8?
