1. "Playful" means the film is fun and not serious or frightening. It suggests the story is treated in a light-hearted way.
2. "Distinctive atmosphere" means the film has a special and noticeable feeling or mood. The text shows this by describing toy weapons, creamy pies and the contrast between serious ideas and silly behaviour.
3. "Striking" is a good word because these features stand out strongly to the audience. For example, the songs help move the plot forward, and the soundtrack, choreography and facial expressions work together to show meaning.
